Final examination	40%	During the exam session	The exam consists of 50 closed-ended questions and 10 short practical tasks. The exam is graded on a scale of 1 to 10: 10-9 points: excellent and very good, 100-90% correct answers. 8-7 points: good and sufficient, 89-70% correct answers. 6-5 points: satisfactory and weak: 69-50% correct answers. 4-3 points: knowledge and skills do not exceed 49-30% correct answers. 2-1-0 points: knowledge and skills do meet minimum requirements.
2 tests	30%	October, November	The tests consist of 20 closed-ended questions and 5 short practical tasks. The average test score is calculated. Assessment of the tests: 10-9 points: excellent and very good, 100-90% correct answers 8-7 points: good and sufficient, 89-70% correct answers. 6-5 points: satisfactory and weak: 69-50% correct answers. 4-3 points: knowledge and skills do not exceed 49-30% correct answers. 2-1-0 points: knowledge and skills do meet minimum requirements.
Assessment of practical tasks	30%	During the semester	Students complete practical tasks specified in the course description, discuss them with the lecturer and correct any mistakes.  3 points - all tasks are completed, the student actively consults with the teacher, corrects the mistakes made;  2 - 50% of the tasks are completed; the student consults with the teacher, corrects the mistakes made.

1 - completed less than 20% of tasks, rarely consults with the teacher, does not perform error analysis. 0 - the student rarely or not at all performs practical tasks,
does not consult with the teacher or does it very rarely
