Oral presentation on the chosen subject. Powerpoint presentation of	20 20	Deadline	Oral presentation at a seminar is evaluated using 10-point system. Combined assessment of two seminars constitutes 20% of the final assessment. This is followed by the presentation of the research design/proposal on the agreed essay topic which constitutes another 20% of the final assessment. 1-4 points – the student demonstrates little relevant knowledge and/or understanding of the subject, is not able to conduct data and information selection independently, fails to formulate the problem, and set aims and objectives for the topic.
the research design/proposal on the agreed topic.			5 points — the student demonstrates some understanding and awareness of the relevant concepts and literature, is able to formulate the problem, and set aims and objectives, operates historical facts, but does not demonstrate an adequate level of understanding and/or depth of analysis and/or degree of synthesis. 6-7 points — the student demonstrates sound understanding of a topic, is able to formulate problems related to archaeological heritage of the Baltic region, demonstrates awareness of the broader historical and cultural context, but the work is limited in terms of its depth of analysis and/or quality of findings. 8-9 points — the student demonstrates very good understanding of a topic, is able to identify and raise major problems related to archaeological heritage, its communication and managements. The student is able to combine visual material with major questions of the research, and the work is well researched and analysed with substantial conclusions. 10 points — the student demonstrates excellent understanding of a topic. The work is very vell researched with in-depth and original analysis and fully evaluated findings and conclusions.
