Purpose of the course unit: programme competences to be developed

The objective of this course is to develop an understanding of creative writing techniques and strategies, as well as the communicative skills of the German language. These skills include the ability to understand, produce and edit written texts in German in a variety of genres and styles, using appropriate creative writing strategies and selecting the appropriate linguistic devices according to the target audience.

The course is designed to foster creativity, the ability to work and learn both independently and in a group, to communicate and cooperate, and to apply knowledge in practice.

The application of peer-review methods to the analysis and improvement of both one's own and other students' texts facilitates the development of analytical and critical thinking, a willingness to learn and strive for quality, and an understanding of the German language system.

Average grade of individual and group assignments	40 %	during the semester	Assessment criteria of the texts include the following: 1. Contents of the text and originality: The content of the text is entirely consistent with the communicative purpose. The topic is comprehensively addressed. The ideas are clearly and precisely formulated, with sufficient detail. The main ideas are developed and supported by appropriate details and examples. The text is original, and the idea is realised in a creative manner. 2. Coherence and cohesion: The content is presented in a logical and coherent manner, with the main ideas and supporting details consistently highlighted. The text makes effective use of a variety of linking words and demonstrates clear connections between ideas. It is well organised into paragraphs. 3. Linguistic expression (vocabulary, grammar, orthography): The linguistic expression employed varies according to the context. The vocabulary is broad and rich, used correctly and including a variety of stylistic devices appropriate to express communicative intentions, feelings, desires, etc. The text is freely paraphrased to avoid repetition and the use of rarer words and more complex structures is frequent. The appropriate register is chosen. The text is devoid of any grammatical and/or orthographic errors and employs both simple and complex grammatical forms and structures correctly.
