This module will teach the practice of thick description, drawing on the work of Clifford Geertz and other anthropologists. These methods are defined as a way of conveying the cultural context and meaning that people give to actions, words, objects, etc. It is hoped that students who come from abroad and are not part of the local culture will be able to understand and explain the meaning of 'local' behaviour by applying insights from anthropology and communication studies. Students will also learn about the study of languages and cultures in the field of environmental communication, the importance of fieldwork in international

Aim of the module (course unit): competences foreseeen by the study programme

In the 21st century, anthropological studies of the cultural fieldwork have taken on a new meaning. They are applied in the areas of international relations, political communication, heritage information and communication, etc. The aim of the module is to understand and apply, through teaching and learning, the principles of observation and recording in a chosen cultural field. It is expected that at the end of the semester a "thick" description will be produced as a field diary of an anthropologist. It should consist of a collage of narratives based on observation, experience, readings, quotations, and a variety of impressions. A thick description explains not only human behaviour but also its context. In this case, the context consists of a new environment, enriched with new linguistic and cultural experiences. It is therefore important to

understand this environment adequately and to convey the new knowledge and experience in an appropriate form. This module would therefore teach the practices of thick description, drawing on the work of Clifford Geertz and other anthropologists. These are defined as a way of conveying the cultural context and meaning that people give to actions, words, objects, etc. It is hoped that students who come from abroad and are not part of the local culture will be able to understand and explain the meaning of 'indigenous' behaviour by applying insights from anthropology and communication studies.
