Purpose of the course unit: programme competences to be developed		
<p>Principal objectives of the course unit are to develop the ability to understand and analyze German legal language, the competence to express legal concepts clearly in both spoken and written German and to connect legal concepts with broader humanities' topics.</p> <p>The content of the course is differentiated according to learners' language level (from A2+ up to C2) and personal needs. The following general competencies also are being developed: analytical and critical thinking, independent work, time management, teamwork, problem-solving skills and digital competence: the ability to use IT and AI tools in order to learn and communicate more effectively, understanding the ethical aspects of such use.</p>
