Purpose of the course unit		
<p>The principal goal of this course unit is to introduce the Asia-Pacific region from the political point of view, i.e. its principal states' political systems, relations among themselves as well as with outside actors. The course examines not only the Western part of the Pacific littoral (Northeast and Southeast Asia), but also the South Asian region (Indian subcontinent) and the most important "peripheral" countries.</p>
