It will also, through reading, individual tasks and discussions in group, enhance skills of autonomous work, critical reading and thinking, in collecting, analysing and synthesizing information and solving problems.

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Assessment strategy	Weight %	Deadline	Assessment criteria
Individual presentation	35	Middle of the semester	During the semester students will have to make individual presentation on one of the course topics: History, Language, Religion, Arts, Music, Literature, Theatre, Cinema, Architecture or Sports of the Home Country. Possible topics will be discussed during the introductory lecture. The justification and quality of the presentation, as well as the novelty and originality of the topic, shall be assessed. Criteria applied to assess presentations: • scope of the presentation, structure of the presentation, • clarity of the raised issue and its interpretation, ability to bring opponents into a discussion of the problem, • support of the discussion, quality of raised questions during the presentation, quality of the material (data/sources). Overall assessment of presentations and discussions shall be assessed in the following way: 10 (excellent); 9 (very good); 8 (good); 7 (highly satisfactory); 6 (satisfactory); 5 (sufficient); 4–1 – presentation unprepared.

Final examination	40	During the session	During the exam session, students will write a final test. The test evaluates students' knowledge of basic facts about Lithuanian History and Culture (discussed during lectures and seminars). Criteria for assessment: correctness of answers. 10 (excellent). Excellent, exceptional knowledge and skills. 95–100 percent of the answers are correct. 9 (very good). Good knowledge and skills. 85–94 percent of the answers are correct. 8 (good). Above average knowledge and skills. 75–84 percent of the answers are correct. 7 (highly satisfactory). Average knowledge and skills. 65–74 percent of the answers are correct. 6 (satisfactory). Knowledge and skills are below average. 55–64 percent of the answers are correct. 5 (sufficient). Knowledge and skills meet the minimum requirements. 45–54 percent of the answers are correct. 4, 3, 2, 1. Minimum requirements are not met. 44 percent and respectively fewer tasks are performed correctly. The final grade is determined during the examination session by multiplying the individual (colloquium) grades by the weighting factor and summing the products.
