Purpose of the course unit		
The main aims of the course are to develop the competence of future language researchers: to introduce the theory, research and methods of lexicology in general and of the German language, and to teach how to apply them by analysing and comparing the structures of the German and other languages; to develop the ability to apply the philological knowledge acquired in practice by carrying out a small independent research project on a chosen topic and presenting it to the audience; to develop analytical and critical thinking; to develop the ability to work in a group and independently, and to develop the engagement to learning and striving to reach the highest quality; to promote creativity in the application of the knowledge acquired.

Students will - understand the position of lexicology in the system of linguistics and the relationship of lexicology to the related disciplines; - acquire the basics of general and German lexicology; - understand the basic structures of German word formation, word meanings, semantic relations of words, and will be able to understand changes in the language system, social and psychological aspects of the development and structure of the German language;	Interactive lectures, tasks, tutorials; classical information methods, demonstration of video and audio recordings, illustration of examples, discussion of teaching material and topics; active learning methods (think-clouds, working in pairs and groups, discussion, preparation and presentation of the individual research projects); independent work (mastering of research methods, gathering and analysing material for the presentation).	Active participation in seminars (practical and research assignments), two examination tests during the semester and oral presentation of the individual research project prepared on the topic selected.
