Purpose of the course unit (module): programme competences to be developed

The purpose of this course is to provide students with theoretical knowledge and skills for the independent analysis of politics of small states via an in-depth study of practical examples coming from the Nordic states (Iceland, Norway, Denmark, Sweden, and Finland).

The course aims to develop subject specific competences, such as the ability to understand and explain the position of small states in the international system, ability to define the vital interests of small (Nordic coastal) states in comparison to traditional military interests of naval powers, in-depth knowledge and understanding of the Nordic states' negotiations with the EU and the challenges and opportunities they face while in the EU, ability to explain and assess the Nordic socioeconomic model and its impact on international policy and economic performance, ability to assess the Nordic states' capacity for withstanding stress and international financial crisis, knowledge of the new challenges (such as climate change, melting of the Arctic) faced by the Nordic states. In addition, the course develops generic competences: ability to work and study individually and in a group, ability to present findings in a coherent and well-argued manner, ability to share insights during discussions, ability to approach political and social phenomenon from a culture-sensitive perspective.
