Goals of the course

The course aims to develop understanding and knowledge of the common cultural heritage and actual cultural contacts of the countries of the Baltic region (primarily, the Baltic countries, Poland, Germany and the Nordic countries) as well as the region's cultural history and the cultural relationships between them.

The course aims to develop the general skills of the students: analytical, critical and creative thinking (to critically evaluate, systematize and process information from various sources; to generate ideas), problem-solving, social and communicative skills (to identify relevant problems to be solved, to discuss alternative choices; to make informed decisions, based on facts and experience; to engage in constructive teamwork), academic and professional ethics (understand and respect ethical requirements; to comply with the principles of responsibility and integrity; to engage in dialogue and seek mutual understanding).

The course aims to develop the subject-related skills of the students too, e.g. the knowledge about and application of the theories and methods of the field; ability to formulate a research question and to communicate research findings to different audiences.
