Annotation of the course content

This course is intended for students who, during their BA and MA studies, had only a basic training in syntax. Its goal is to familiarize PhD students with the multiplicity of syntactic approaches, with the assumptions underlying Phrase Structure Syntax and Dependency Syntax, and with schools and competing developments within both models of syntax. In order to establish a connection with other courses on the doctoral programme, the syntax-semantics interface is also dealt with. Readings and thematic focus may be adapted to the special needs of the participants.
