## Course annotation

This course is aimed at study of the problems of political philosophy. It has an interdisciplinary perspective.

The aim of the course is to examine how is the understanding of politics related to the subject of globalization. Usually sociologists are concerned with globalization. Meanwhile, political scientists are quite indifferent to it. One of the main purposes of this course is to examine why political scientists are indifferent to the subject of globalization. Two main tasks must be accomplished here: to explore assumptions of current influential concepts of politics and to show its relation to the subject of globalization.

This course relies on the assumption that the subject of globalization is a big challenge for contemporary political philosophy. That discipline has its own steady themes of discussions. These themes usually are studied without direct links to globalization. Problematic relation between political philosophy and the subject of globalization is an almost unstudied object in humanities and social sciences.

This course deals with the question, why one of the oldest political sciences responds so little to contemporary discussions in social sciences concerning globalization. Is that determined by the nature of political philosophy or by specific problems of philosophical discussions concerning globalization? Also other questions can be raised here. How the introduction of the subject of globalization may change the discussion of political philosophers? Why the attitude towards the phenomenon of globalization so differs in political sociology and political philosophy? Why contemporary contexts of discussions about globalization so little affect polemics of political philosophers? Whether term *globalization* could be changed into different and more known to political philosophers?

Classroom work is organized on demand.

Grading requirements are linked to the theme of dissertation and are set individually.
