











Two significant projects continue to be successfully implemented at the Faculty of History of Vilnius University: 'Past & Future Millet Foodways', conducted by Prof. Giedrė Motuzaitė Matuzevičiūtė Keen and funded by the European Research Council, and the activities of the (Post)Authoritarian Landscapes Research Centre, headed by Prof. Arūnas Streikus. Both of these projects are unique within the context of the University: the project of Giedrė Motuzaitė Matuzevičiūtė Keen stands out due to its exceptional ERC grant, while the (Post)Authoritarian Landscapes Research Centre project is distinguished by its innovativeness and multifaceted approach. The Faculty carries out the latter project together with colleagues from the Faculty of Philosophy and the Faculty of Chemistry and Geosciences. The Centre's researchers apply an interdisciplinary landscape perspective to explore the relationship between (post)authoritarian societies and the natural environment, highlighting the relevance of an eco-social approach to societal analysis.

This year, the Faculty took another step in consolidating itself as a significant centre for archaeological research. Assoc. Prof. Dr Justina Poškienė prepared and won the Research Council of Lithuania's call for proposals for the infrastructure renewal programme. This achievement will enable the launch of a new research direction at the Faculty in archaeological artefact material science.

Given the relevance of digital humanities, researchers from the Faculties of Philology and History submitted a joint proposal to the Research Council of Lithuania's call for updating the infrastructure needed for scientific research. The project won funding that will allow us to develop this important research area and integrate it into the University's study programmes. The proposal was prepared by Dr Ernesta Kazakėnaitė, a researcher at the Faculty of Philology, and Dr Sergii Gurbych, a postdoctoral trainee at the Faculty of History.

The Faculty's researchers – Assoc. Prof. Rūta Šermukšnytė, Dr Akvilė Naudžiūnienė, Dr Norbertas Černiauskas – and Faculty alumnus Dr Vytautas Volungevičius completed their work on preparing new general education history textbooks aligned with the updated national curriculum. This year, eight textbooks were prepared for Years 5, 6, 9, and 10, including one specifically designed for Lithuanian schools in North America.

Dr Viltė Janušauskaitė was recognised as the winner of the 'Women in Science' competition organised by the Academies of Sciences of the three Baltic States and the National Commissions for UNESCO.

The President awarded Professor Marija Drėmaitė with the Cross of the Knight of the Order of the Lithuanian Grand Duke Gediminas for her research on modern Lithuanian architecture, culture, and heritage, and in recognition of her educational activities, for initiating and implementing international projects that have contributed significantly to Lithuania's visibility worldwide. Professor Jurgita Verbickienė was honoured for her long-standing and consistent scientific and expert work in researching, highlighting, and presenting Jewish history, culture, and heritage in Lithuania, as well as for developing and implementing approaches to integrating Jewish history into public and academic discourse.

Dr Tetiana Boriak was presented with the Rector's Science Award for her significant monograph on the oral history of Holodomor. This year, the University played an active role as a participant and organiser of the Lithuanian Season in France, largely thanks to the contributions of Rector Prof. Rimvydas Petrauskas, Pro-Rector Dr Artūras Vasiliauskas, and Prof. Marija Drėmaitė. One of the inaugural events was co-organised with Sorbonne University, where one of the two presentations, 'From the Last Medieval Kingdom to Modern Democracy: Lithuania's Road to Europe', was delivered by Prof. Rimvydas Petrauskas. An international conference, 'Lithuania and France: a Distant Neighbourhood – a Shared Experience', was hosted together with Sorbonne University and was attended by Lithuanian and French researchers. Our Faculty was represented by Prof. Marija Drėmaitė, Prof. Irena Vaišvilaitė, and Assoc. Prof. Loreta Skurvydaitė.





Number of admitted students who received the highest evaluation in their matura exams in 2023-2024



Number of students, 2019-2024




Change in the number of students by study cycle in 2024 compared to the average of 2019–2023

Change in the number of graduates by cycle in 2024 compared to the average of 2019–2023





visits under the Erasmus+ programme in 2024


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Student-faculty ratio, 2023–2024

Graduate career success in 2024



Mobility of students, doctoral students and employees, 2019–2024



Doctoral studies


Doctoral study visits to higher education institutions and companies with a duration of more than five days


Academic and non-academic employees

Visits under the Erasmus+ programme for teaching and learning purposes*






Successfully defended dissertations, 2019–2024



The total number of successfully defended dissertations during the period of 2019–2024 is 28


