











The year 2024 was full of significant achievements for the Institute of International Relations and Political Science of Vilnius University, which not only strengthened our academic community but also contributed to the welfare of the general public.

The Institute has once again demonstrated its leadership in scientific research, with two infrastructures coordinated by the Institute included in the Lithuanian Roadmap for Research Infrastructures: Monitoring Electoral Democracy (MEDem LT) and Lithuanian Longitudinal Social Survey (LIST).

To ensure the highest standards of scientific ethics, the Institute established the Research Ethics Compliance Committee, headed by Dr leva Petronytė-Urbonavičienė. International cooperation continued – the first 'ERA Fellowship' project to research the development of FinTech regulation in Europe was launched, and work on the international projects 'Invigorating Enlargement and Neighbourhood Policy for a Resilient Europe' and 'Non-Western Migration Regimes in a Global Perspective' was ongoing. These projects strengthen international relations, allowing the Institute to contribute to overcoming global challenges.

The Institute's researchers published over 70 publications, including three significant monographs. These publications both enrich academic discourse and contribute to a deeper understanding of Lithuanian political processes.

The Institute is actively involved in public education. We are particularly proud of the new civic education module for teachers, which promotes the professional development of teachers and strengthens civic education in schools. This year, many members of the Institute's community were awarded for their outstanding contribution to strengthening the State and public education. Prof. Dr Dovilė Jakniūnaitė and Prof. Dr Natalija Arlauskaitė were given the Rector's Award for organising the National Emancipation Day. Dr Tatsiana Chulitskaya contributed to the research network of the neighbourhood policy in Belarus, and Dr Jogilė Ulinskaitė became the chair of the Research Centers Network of the Memory Studies Association. The 'Facing the Past. Public History for a Stronger Europe' project served to strengthen the Institute's relations with Vilnius City Museum and the National Museum of Lithuania.

In 2024, the renovation of the historical building of the Institute at Vokiečių g. 10 was completed. During the restoration, the original 15th-century look of the building was restored, Renaissance details were preserved, and the authentic beige-khaki façade colours were recreated, complemented by pale relief elements. This project has strengthened the historic value of the building and created an inspiring academic environment.

Members of the Institute community received important awards. Dr Simas Čelutka was awarded the Scholarship for Young Scientists by the Lithuanian Academy of Sciences, Dr Rosita Garškaitė-Antonowicz won the Best Dissertation Competition, and doctoral student Valda Budreckaitė was awarded for the best qualitative thesis in Lithuania. It was particularly pleasing that the Director of the Institute, Prof. Dr Margarita Šešelgytė, was awarded the prestigious Constance Council Prize.

These achievements and events show that the Institute remains one of the leading centres of political science not only in Lithuania but internationally as well. The commitment of the Institute's community to research, innovation, and public welfare provides a solid foundation for future challenges and opportunities.





### Number of students, 2019-2024




### Change in the number of students by study cycle in 2024 compared to the average of 2019–2023

### Change in the number of graduates by cycle in 2024 compared to the average of 2019–2023 $\,$











### Number of publications, 2019–2024





### Successfully defended dissertations, 2019-2024


