In 2024, the most significant event for the Vilnius University Museum was securing funding for the renovation project 'Adomo Mickevičiaus muziejaus Vilniuje remontas' ('Repair Works at the Adam Mickiewicz Museum in Vilnius'). The project received EUR 86,353.06 from the budget of the Republic of Poland through the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, with Jan Olszewski Aid to Poles in the East Foundation acting as an intermediary. A comparable amount of funding is expected in 2025. The contribution of Vilnius University, together with the funds provided by the Republic of Poland, enabled the complete refurbishment of the Museum and the adaptation of the premises to meet modern requirements for exhibitions, educational activities, and events. The repair work is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2025.

The temporary closure of the Adam Mickiewicz Museum for refurbishment led to a decline in visitor numbers and revenue. However, the overall attendance of the Museum still increased by 4.6 per cent compared to 2023, with 66,797 people visiting the Museum in 2024. The number of participants in educational activities increased in particular: in 2023, 454 people participated, rising to 1,371 in 2024, although the number of activities remained similar. The growth resulted from successful engagement with target audiences – Lithuanian schoolchildren and teachers – leading to significantly larger educational groups.

The Museum staff's promotion of science, educational, and research activities are becoming increasingly visible in Lithuania and abroad. The Vilnius City History Research Scholarship, which Vilnius City Municipality awarded to Museum staff Agnė Poškienė and Julija Jonušaitė, enabled the employees to carry out a scientific study 'Stepono Batoro universiteto astronomijos observatorijos komplekso kūrimo raida 1919–1939 m.' ('Development of the Astronomical Observatory Complex at Stephen Bathory University in 1919–1939'). In September 2024, at the international conference of ICOM-UMAC and the European Network of Academic Heritage UNIVERSEUM held in Dresden, Germany, the Museum staff submitted five proposals and delivered four presentations in different formats on the heritage of Vilnius University and the Museum's activities. In 2024, partnerships were developed with Polish academic heritage institutions and literature museums.

The Museum has been actively working on researching and digitising items from its collections. Given the geopolitical circumstances, the focus was on identifying Vilnius University's most significant cultural assets, improving their preservation, and digitising collection descriptions. Work continued on the development of an emergency management and evacuation plan. In 2024, 236 valuable objects from the Museum's holdings were digitised and made publicly available via the LIMIS system. Moreover, the activities of the University's 'Recovering Memory' initiative were also continued – background research was conducted on 73 potential nominees for their suitability, with 41 being issued a symbolic 'Memory Diploma'.

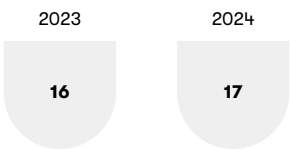

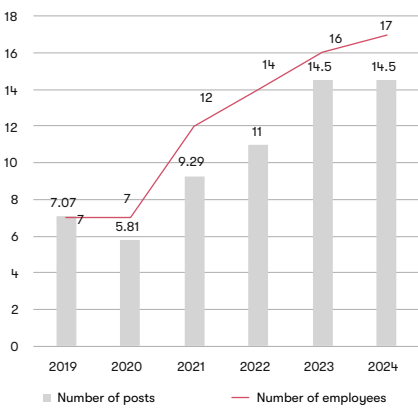

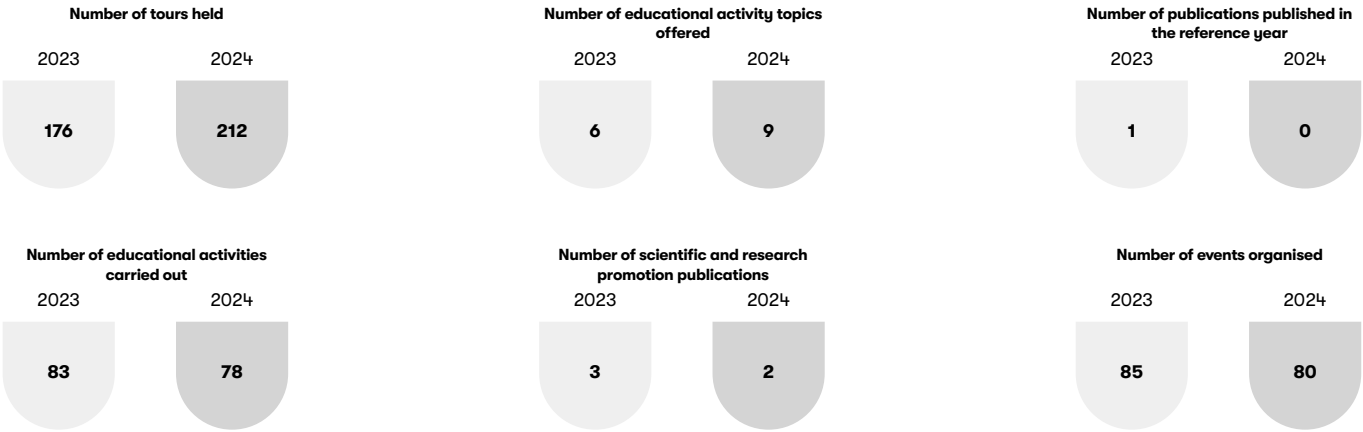

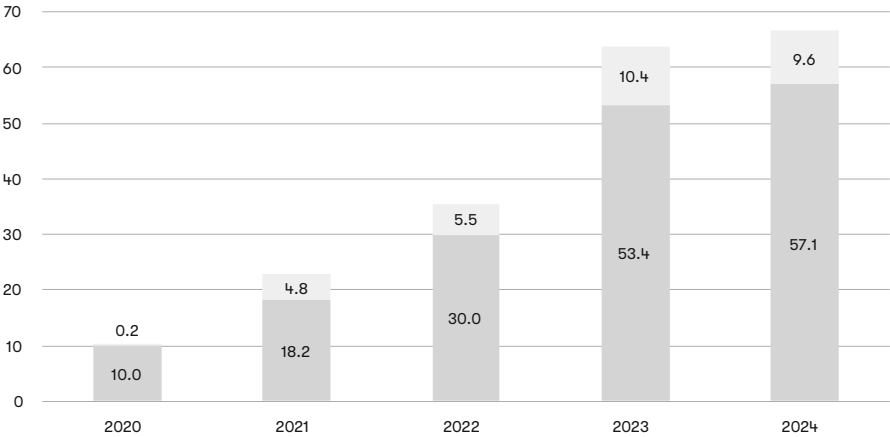
Change in the number of museum valuables exhibited and kept in the Museum's collections in 2024 compared to the average of 2019–2023

■ Number of visitors to the Museum who paid for their visit, in thousands

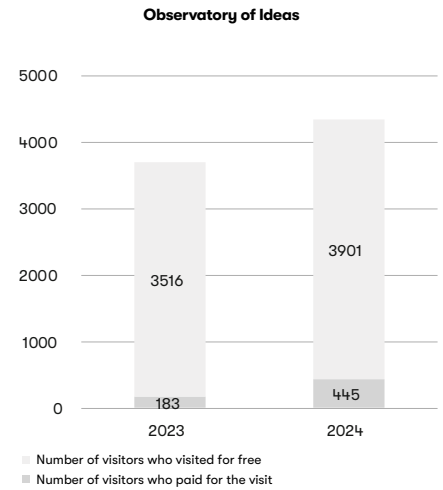
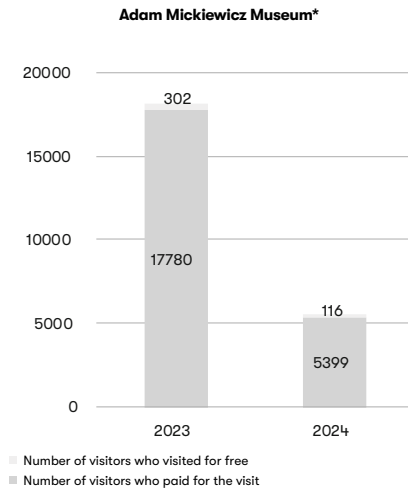
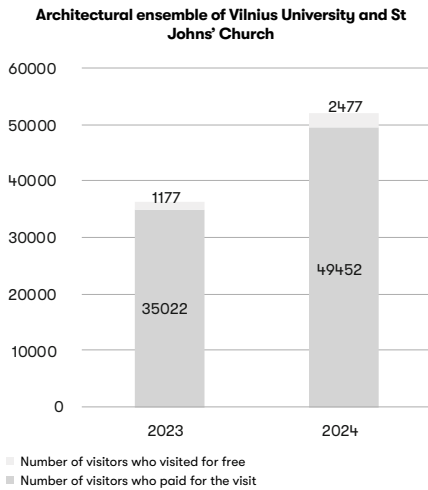
Change in the number of total visitors in 2024 compared to the average of 2020–2023



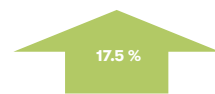
Change in the number of visitors who visited the Museum for free in 2024 compared to the average from 2020–2023



## Number of Museum visitors at the units, 2023–2024

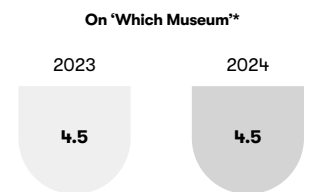
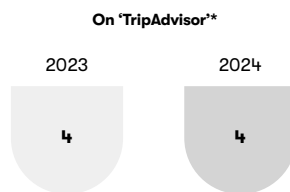
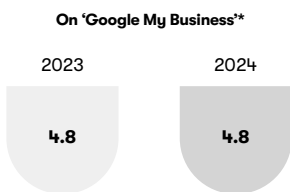


### Annual change in the number of visitors



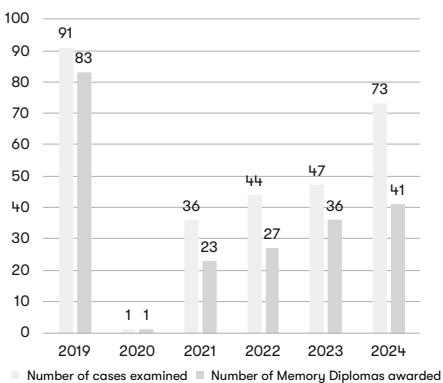

## Visitor rating, 2023–2024



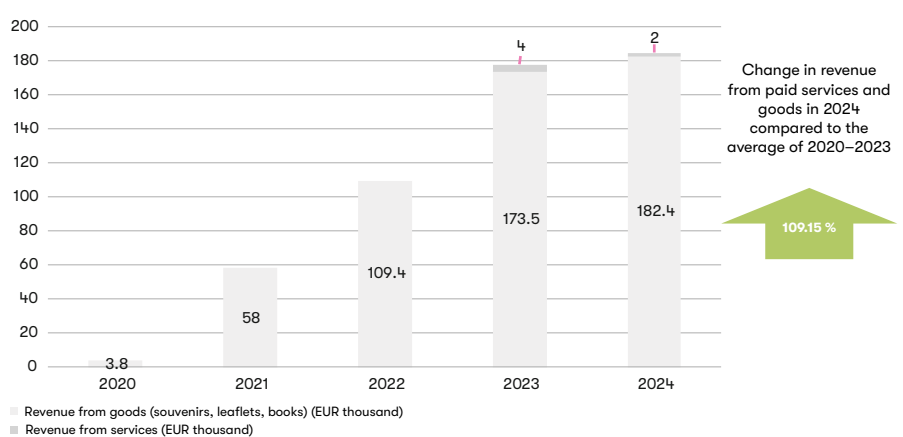
